Director, Please!

Sometimes even the best forget the basics, even when they're awesome directors. This was evident during the Bridge Olympics team game at the recent Spectacle regional in Southbridge. In the finals of the KOs, after receiving the boards for the second half, South counted his cards and discovered he had 15. The director was called and took the board back to the other table to see if anyone could tell where the extra cards belonged.

A few minutes later, the director returned to explain the hand had been played that way. It was an exciting grand slam, declared by none

other than Horace Gower with Sue Miguel playing the dummy, *and no one had noticed!*

Don't forget to count your cards *face down* as the Law requires – even if you're having a rollicking time in the Bridge Olympics. (See Law 7: Control of Board and Cards.) ■

What Are the Odds of That?

We recently held a hand in which all 13 cards were red: seven diamonds and six hearts. You might ask, as we did: what are the odds of that?

Well, the chance that the first one would be red is of course 26/52, or 50%. The chance that the next one would be red is 25/51, about 49%. The next is 24/50 (48%), etc. down through 14/40 (35%). And the odds of *all* of them being red is the product of the individual probabilities:

$$(26/52) \times (25/51) \times \dots \times (14/40) \approx 0.00164\%$$

In scientific notation, that's 1.64×10^{-5} . In ordinary English, that's less than two one-thousandths of one percent!

No matter how you write it, don't hold your breath expecting to see another hand like that anytime soon. ■

Instant Matchpoint Winners

Many New England clubs participated in June's ACBL-Wide Instant Matchpoint Game, Digital Edition. Sixteen tables came to play at



the Viking Bridge Club and had a great time, including Alev Elci and Jeremy Shen. Little did they know they were in for a pleasant surprise. Alev was super nervous to be playing in the open game with a

fix-up partner. Not only that, traffic held her up and she arrived late and had no time to

discuss their card. You probably can guess what happened next, they won – 1st overall! Both were so excited to earn the coveted GOLD point. That's not all! When the district results were in, they topped every other partnership in New England, earning ten bonus masterpoints.

But, the best part of the story is that Alev started the game with just 5 masterpoints, and Jeremy had 250. Beginners and advancing players take heart: you can still play with the big kids and win!

In case you don't know these games work, each board in play has a printed score sheet tucked underneath. After playing the hand, North consults the score sheet, and each pair will learn exactly their MP award (as a percentage) for that hand. At the end of the event, everyone will receive a booklet with expert analysis of the hands. The top score in each direction is awarded one full gold masterpoint, and the remaining awards are half red, half black at 81% Sectional rating.

Another Instant Matchpoint Game is on the schedule for October 30th. Ask your local club if they will participate. ■
